MY NOMINEE MADE A DIFFERENCE IN A CHILD'S LIFE BY

Over the teaching careers of these two truly outstanding retired educators, they have made a difference in thousands of students' lives. They have made such a difference, that each of them has had the distinction of being selected as St. Joseph School District Teacher of the Year. They also share the similarity of having taught in the St. Joseph School District Gifted Program. Sue Wagner taught primarily at Skaith School, where she coordinated the gifted program and originated Rainbows. Janet Fite taught Odyssey at Bode Middle School. Sue and Janet continue to assist in a variety of ways in the District. They are being honored with the Davis-Langemach Award for their offering such a highly unique and a very successful summer school class. This class not only provided a rewarding opportunity for its participants, but also needed historical information for our community.

During the St. Joseph School District Summer School session of 2004, students enrolled in Bode Middle School's "Cemetery Capers." This highly popular class was filled with fourth through eighth grade students who deciphered the stories of some of the oldest tombstones in Mount Mora Cemetery. In their research, they had to rely on their cryptic skills, working as a team to piece together the letters they could see. Several of the students had the pleasure of locating some of their own ancestors in their search. The Internet and library research aided the students. Results of the findings were given to Mount Mora Cemetery for its historical information base in hopes of assisting others in researching family history. The "Cemetery Capers" class was so popular with the students that Sue and Janet have been asked to teach the class again in this summer. The *St. Joseph News-Press* headlined a story about the class on June 17.

Mount Mora Cemetery is located a few blocks off of Frederick Avenue and east of City Hall, on Mount Mora Road and is the oldest operating cemetery in St. Joseph. The cemetery is the home of three Missouri Governors, Unionists, pioneers, Englishmen, Generals, Southern sympathizers, Pony Express Riders, and a US Ambassador.

Ms. Wagner and Mrs. Fite hope more than anything that the students now have ownership in their community and that this experience will encourage them to be involved in more service projects.

Davis-Langemach PTA Council Award of Excellence

Background

The "Davis-Langemach PTA Council Award of Excellence" is named after Mrs. True Davis, Sr., and Mrs. Vernon Langemach, both highly admired St. Joseph ladies, who are past State PTA Presidents.

Determination of Winner

The administrator, teacher, or staff member, who has been nominated, must have made a major difference in the life of a student of the St. Joseph School District. It should be something that will be of major impact in the child's life and must have taken place between the first day of school and the last day of school.

A nomination may be made by a parent/family member, administrator, teacher, staff person, or other adult community member. (No self nominations please.)

The administrator of the nominee as well as the nominating party must sign the form to assure validity.

Each month one winner will be selected and recognized by the St. Joseph PTA Council. The winner will be awarded a certificate of recognition. In addition, a book valued at \$25 will be given in honor of the winner to the school where they are employed. If they are not employed at a school, then they may select which school will receive the book.

An impartial panel of three individuals will determine the winners. The panel will include a school district official, a PTA Council representative, and a local parent.

Nominations submitted will be kept for consideration for that school year unless they are chosen as a winner.

The child's name will not be released to the public.

In order to be considered as the next month's award recipient, three copies of the nomination must be received by the 20th of the previous month. The first award will be in September.
